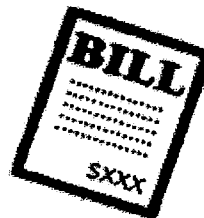

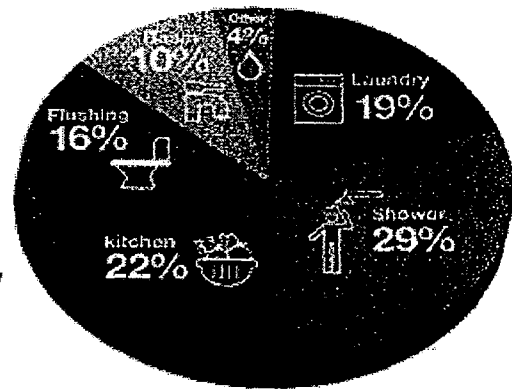

In Singapore, more than 5 million people enjoy potable water at the turn of a tap. It is crucial to educate our people about the rising water demand and the precautionary steps to take to avoid the scarcity of water. Since our nation's independence, the Singapore Water Society (SWS) has built up a comprehensive water conservation programme to reach out to everyone in Singapore.

Studies have shown that the average Singaporean family spends 29% of their water usage on showers and 22% of their water usage on washing in the kitchen sink. SWS's water conservation campaigns were a huge success as water consumption in Singapore has dropped from 165 litres per day in 2003 to the current 151 litres. The target is to lower it to 147 litres by 2020 and 140 litres by 2030.
