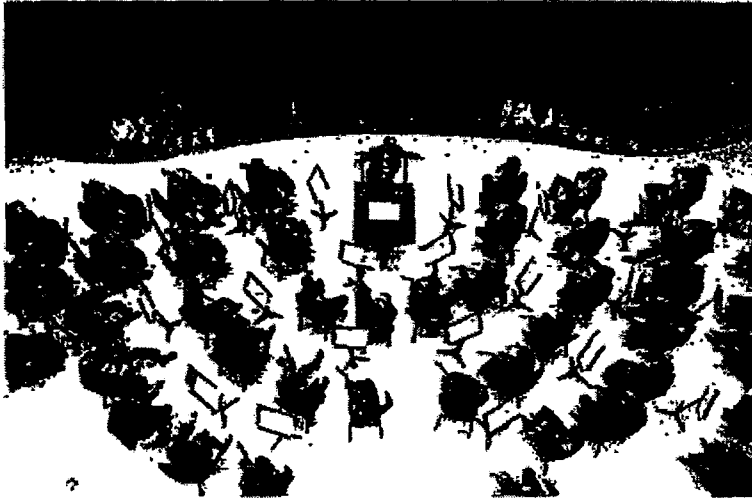

As his four team-mates snorkelled in the shallow waters, Mike finned his way to 40 metres offshore. He relished the feeling of oneness with nature. He scanned the ocean bed to familiarise himself with the depth of the bay so that he might swim with the whales when they came to breed in winter. Large sharks were unknown here and while the temperature of the water could be as low as six degrees Celsius, his wetsuit was thick enough to keep out the cold.

After half an hour, Mike had seen enough. Time to go in. He stopped kicking and let himself drift. Thud! A huge weight slammed into his right shoulder. Clamped around his right arm were the 80-centimetre-wide jaws of a huge shark.

The swimmers surfaced and scanned the horizon. Nothing.

Suddenly, there was an explosion of spray. Mike erupted from the sea, yelling and fighting ferociously. His teammates froze at the sight of the creature that held him. The great white paused for a moment, its head out of the water. Then chillingly, it opened and closed its mouth around Mike.

Think, Daniella urged herself. There must be something you can do. She screamed to the others. "Has anyone got a dive knife?" However, she knew it would be powerless to help. The great white is the ocean's most fearsome creature: 590 kilos of muscle and against which a diver's knife would be useless. Judging by the monster's head, it was at least four metres long. Daniella watched helplessly as the shark pulled Mike beneath the waves.
