World War Two ended on 17 May 1945 in Europe. On that day, Germany surrendered to America. However, the Japanese continued to battle against America, despite repeated demands to end the war.

Mr Truman, America's president at the time, struggled with what to do. Japan had attacked an American naval base at Pearl Harbour. Many Americans felt that the Japanese had to be stopped. Mr Truman decided to do something drastic.

Mr Truman made one of the biggest decisions in history. He ordered the use of an atomic bomb. The bomb was the deadliest weapon ever made. It had been tested, but never used. Scientists believed it could destroy an entire town and cause illness in its people for years to come.

On 6 August 1945, an American airplane dropped the first atomic bomb used in warfare on a Japanese military town, Hiroshima. Three days later, Nagasaki, another town in Japan, suffered the same fate as Hiroshima. Japan was devastated. The bombs killed numerous people. It destroyed large areas of both

cities. the bombs released hazardous chemicals into the air and remained in the atmosphere for some time. This made poeple 20 very sick. Thousands more died because of the exposre to these harmful, cancer-causing chemicals.

The terrible destruction caused by the bombs led Japan to surrender on 2 September 1945. Japan's surrender meant that the war was finally over. 25
