"Talking of the prices of birds, I've seen an ostrich that cost \$300," said the old man, recalling his travels in his youth. "\$300!"	
I looked at him over my spectacles. I had seen another that the owner refused to sell at \$400. You would have thought that five ostriches would have been cheap. But the point was, one of them had swallowed a diamond.	5
The ostrich got it off Sir Padishah from India who was wearing a turban, with the diamond on it. The bird pecked at it suddenly and had it. It then went and mixed with the others. The birds' keeper was not present at that moment, so he did not know which bird it was. The news about the incident spread throughout the ship. In no time, everyone was talking about it. Padishah was greatly affected by the loss.	10
I did not feel very sorry for him. The owner had been boasting about his diamond ever since he boarded the ship that was travelling from Bombay to Southampton.	
The keeper of the five ostriches refused Padishah's proposals to get it out by way of medicine or stomach pump.	15
One of the passengers whose son was a lawyer in London, argued lawfully that what the bird swallowed had become part of it. The only thing that Padishah could do was to sue for damages. Thus, he went privately to the keeper and made an offer for all five ostriches.	
However, the keeper said that he did not have the authority to sell them. He was asked to approach the owner, Mr. Potter who was also onboard the ship.	20
Padishah found Potter in the viewing deck and offered him \$250 for the five birds. This was twice the original cost of the ostriches. Potter said that he would not sell them because he meant to kill them one by one to find the diamond. Padishah burst into tears upon hearing it and Potter was caught by surprise. After thinking it over, Potter relented and decided not to kill the ostriches.	25
Potter offered to sell the birds separately to different people by auctioning off each bird at a starting price of \$80.	
You must understand this diamond was a valuable one – a diamond merchant from Belgium, who was with us, had priced it at \$3000 to \$4000 when Padishah had shown it to him and this idea of an ostrich gamble caught on.	30
So the auction began with the diamond merchant finally getting a bird that seemed to be sick, possibly due to indigestion, with a winning bid of \$180. At once,	

he got a gun and shot it. There was no diamond when the dissection was over. This total disregard for the creature's life persuaded Potter to state that the remaining ostriches were not to be put down until the ship reached Southampton.	35
Obviously, the bids for the other birds were higher. Oddly enough, Padishah did not secure any of them . He claimed that he would file a lawsuit. Later, he even gave his name and address to those who had bought the birds so that they would know where to send the diamond. None of them wanted his name and address and none of them would give him theirs.	40
How did it end? A week or so after arriving at Southampton, I was shopping in London and guess who I saw? Padishah and Potter were walking arm-in-arm and having a grand time.	
If you think about it, and yes, I have thought of that too. There is no doubt the diamond was real and Padishah was a famous Indian prince. I have often seen his name in the newspapers. But whether the bird swallowed the diamond was certainly another matter.	45
