Plastic Seas and Oceans

According to the National Geographic Society, single-use plastics have found their way into our water sources at an astonishing rate every year. Marine animals mistake plastic for food, while others can become entangled in the trash. Even the ubiquitous drinking straw has become a growing threat because they are seldom recycled due to their small and lightweight nature. Several organisations around the world have come together to say "No" to straws!

What Can We Do?

- **Reduce:** To eliminate some of the excess packaging ending up in landfills and the waters, encourage your family to shop for snacks, cereal and pasta in bulk. Then, store them all in reusable glass jars.
- **Reuse:** Bring your own reusable bags instead of plastic bags provided by stores. Instead of packing your sandwich and snacks in plastic bags, use reusable containers.
- **Recycle:** Think about how often you use plastic water bottles, and see if you can make a change. Instead of going out with the trash, plastic bottles can be turned into items like flower pots or pieces of decorative art.

When Father returned from work, I told him about the dog. "Dad, please persuade Mother to let us keep it," John pleaded. Father smiled knowingly and told us to be patient. That night as I lay in bed, I could not stop thinking about how the dog came into our house. I remembered running home after soccer practice and heading straight to the kitchen for a cold drink. It dawned on me that I had left the front gate open. I grinned and decided to keep that secret to myself. I snuggled under the blanket and fell asleep with an inkling that a new member would join the family soon.

After several failed attempts to find the dog's owner, Mother gave in and allowed us to adopt it. "Daniel, 'Robin' is not a suitable name for a German Shepherd! It's not a bird!" John protested to my suggestion. My brother and I argued over naming our new pet at the dinner table. Meanwhile, the dog sat at Mother's feet quietly. "Stop it! 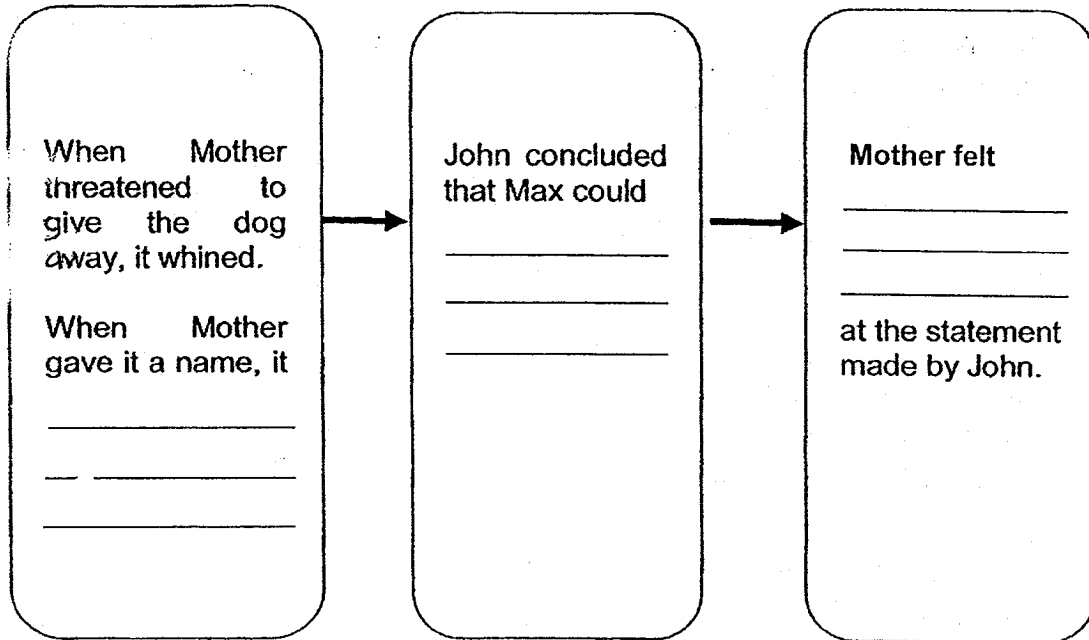
