Every year, new smartphones are released with promises of cutting-edge features and better performance. Advertisements claim that upgrading to new models will significantly improve user experience, causing consumers to eagerly anticipate new phone models. However, in many cases, the actual difference between old and new models is minor, while the price increase is substantial. It is worth considering whether the improvements in new models are indeed value for money.

Advertisements intentionally focus on features such as faster processing speed or higher camera quality to create the impression that the new model is a major improvement.
