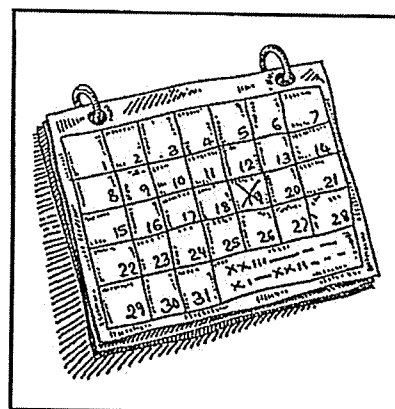
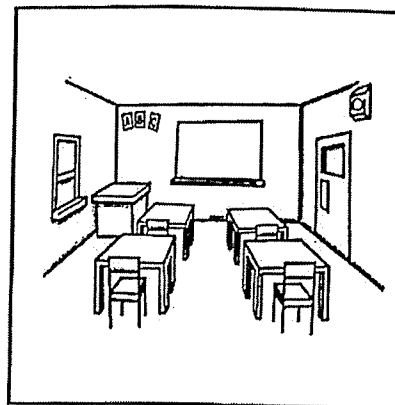

The extract below is taken from an article about zoos.

Zoos play a valuable role in developing an appreciation of wildlife. Sadly, questions about how zoos manage their enclosures have risen. Some zoos neglect cleaning their enclosures, resulting in a greater risk of diseases spreading. Others might house animals in enclosures that are cramped or unfamiliar, leaving them stressed. As such, some animals may display unusual signs of aggression or take a much longer time to finish their food. The more sociable types of animals may become withdrawn and isolate themselves.

Furthermore, how zoos utilise donations is hotly debated. Donations are often collected in the name of conservation. Apart from habitat conservation, it is also reasonable that a portion of the donations is used to pay the zoo's staff for they have a direct impact on taking care of the animals. However, some zoos may prioritise using their donations to build attractions just to bring in more visitors. Others might breed exotic animals like lions or tigers to draw crowds but neglect them in their old age.
