The early morning sun streamed through the high windows. Medals and trophies from years past lined the walls. Among them, proudly displayed in the center, was Mum's Olympic silver medal from Beijing 2008. My mind wandered back to when I was six, afraid to even do a forward roll. The gymnasium had seemed enormous then. Mum would spot me, her hands ready to catch me if I fell. When I had crashed during my first competition on the balance beam, she had been there at the edge of the mat, encouraging me to continue. The memory was still vivid – the hushed audience, and my trembling legs as I stood up again.	15
"Every great gymnast falls, Sophie," she had whispered then, "but only the best ones get back up."	
The gymnasium's mirrors reflected the morning light, just as they had done all those years ago. I remembered watching her practise after hours, chalking up her hands and working on the balance beam. "Let me show them, Mum," I said, performing the combination she had taught me years ago. The younger students followed my lead, their faces showing the same determination I once had. I heard Mum giving advice, just as clear and confident as ever, guiding the next generation of gymnasts.	40

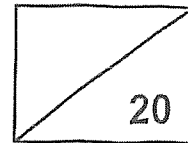
