I was familiar with the subway but at that time, it was a tube of endless white tiles. I was exhausted. Worst of all, no lifts were working. Crying yet again, I tried to lift my suitcase up the stairs.	
Suddenly in my slog there were hands. No one said anything but each time I faced another set of steps, a hand would grip the suitcase handle and lift it. At the top of the steps, the hand would let go and I would pull the suitcase to the next set. And just as I was about to struggle again, another hand would appear.	25
It happened several times. I never looked up because I could not stop crying. I do remember thinking through the haze of grief that each hand looked different, that many different people helped me without asking or saying anything. 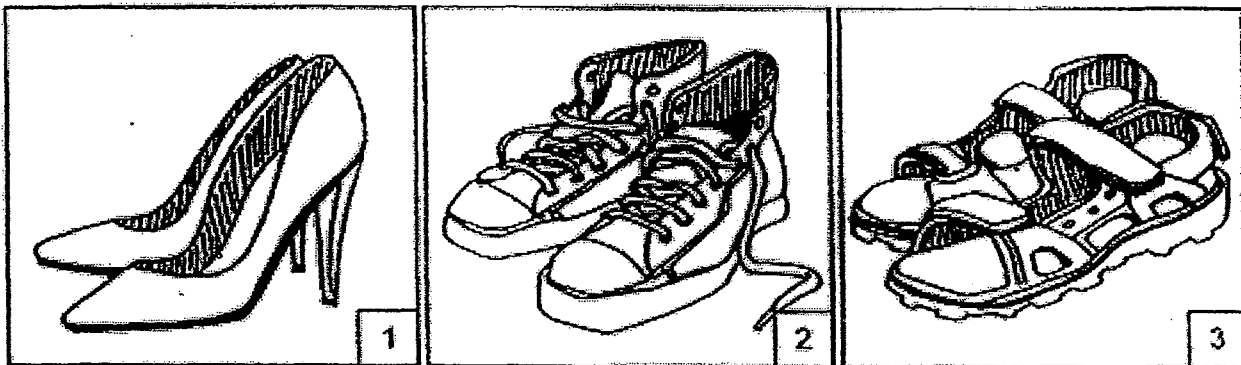

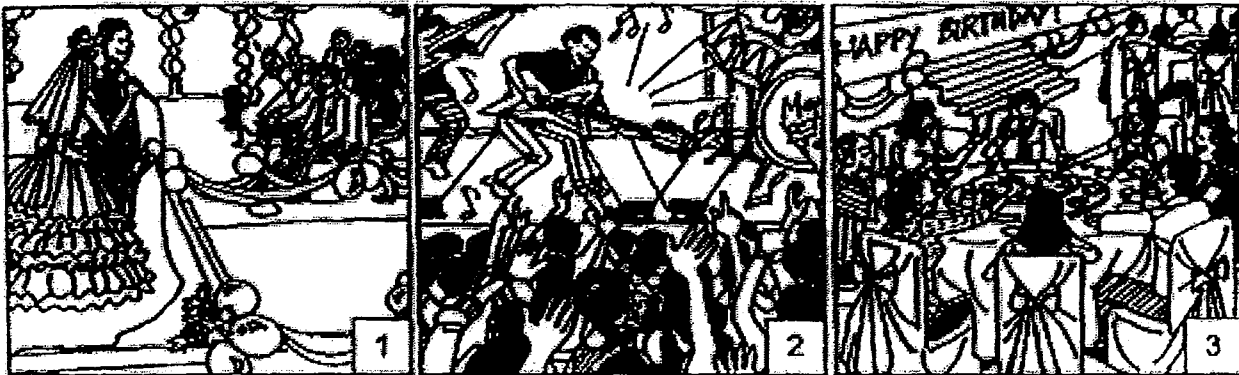

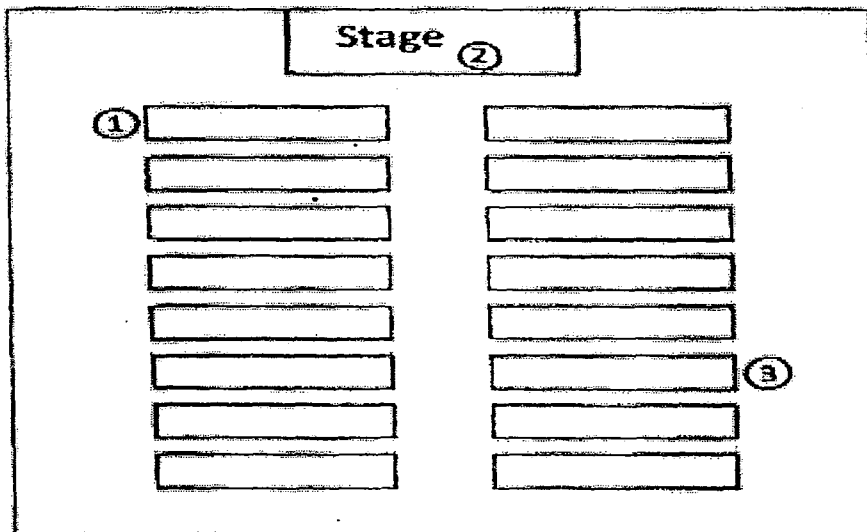
