Tips on How to Make a Paper Mache Mask

What you need

- Balloon
- Strips of newspaper
- Paper mache glue
- Paper
- Scissors
- Rubber band
- Hole puncher
- Markers
- Paint

Instructions

- 1) Blow the balloon up to the size of your face. (To be used later for your mask)
- 2) Coat the balloon with two to three layers of newspaper strips or plain paper soaked in paper mache glue and let it dry completely.
- 3) Cover it with two to three more layers of newspaper strips or plain paper (soaked in the paper mache glue) and leave to dry completely.
- 4) Pop the paper mache balloon (after the glue has dried) with a needle.
- 5) Use scissors to cut the paper mache ball in half.
- 6) Draw the mask face features such as a nose, eyes and mouth. Cut eye shapes out of the mask.
- 7) Make two small holes on the sides around the ears area using a hole puncher and put a rubber band through the holes securing with a knot.
- 8) Paint the mask in vivid and expressive colours.
- 9) Add feathers, sequins and glitter to give your mask more flair.

Section I : Comprehension -Open-ended (20 marks)

As the *Easy Rider* headed out to sea, Dallas Reedy and nine other crew members had no inkling the trip was doomed. It was to become one of New Zealand's worst maritime disasters, with the eleven-metre fishing boat fighting against the elements.

Reedy was on the deck as the *Easy Rider* punched into the tide, bounced over waves and slid over their tips before slamming down into the troughs below. Reedy could not see it coming, but he could hear it. **It sounded like a jet engine.** A roaring wave hit the starboard side and soon the entire deck was swamped. Then, the *Easy Rider* leaned over to one side and in an instant it was upside down, and Reedy went under.

As soon as he hit the water, his life jacket and boots were sucked off. The sea temperature was 13°C. A man wearing a life jacket could survive up to five hours before succumbing to muscle fatigue. After a while, hypothermia (*a dangerous drop in body temperature*) would set in. Reedy knew he had to stay out of the water for as long as possible. He fumbled around for anything to help him stay afloat. He managed to get hold of a rope attached to the boat. The waves pulled him around, slamming him into the side of the hull. It was slippery and barnacled like a whale. He wedged himself between the propeller and the rudder as waves continued to crash over him. Reedy thought he was going to drown. The *Easy Rider's* dinghy was still tied up – only metres away. However, if he could not reach it or unleash it, he was likely to drown. Thus, he stayed put, occasionally standing and squatting to keep his blood moving.

There was no moon. No stars. There was only the boat's light, which was still attached to a battery. After fifteen minutes, it went dark. He banged on the hull with his fists hoping to get a reply from those who were in the cabins. There was nothing – only the sound of the ocean. Two hours passed. Then came another sound. **Woosh!** It was like a last dying breath. As the air escaped from the boat, the *Easy Rider* tipped vertical and began to sink.

Dallas Reedy was alone in the dark. It was so cold he felt like his body was shutting down. He struggled to stay afloat. Almost immediately, it popped to the surface – a 20-litre, plastic petrol canister. He slid his fingers through the grip and held on tight. **The morning ... if he could make it to morning then that was his best chance.** In the dark, he had no reference point. He did not dare take the risk. He would wait. "Hold on," he told himself not to let go. He thought of his son at home, snuggling into bed, no idea that his father was out in the ocean fighting for his life. He saw things in the water. Millions of them – they sparkled in the night. The bioluminescent marine life was the only light he had seen in hours. For the first time since tragedy had struck, he thought, "There is hope."

The sun finally hauled itself over the horizon. It hit his skin and he began to feel warmth and a sense of hope again. He looked about him and just as he expected, land was visible. He started swimming, pushing out the canister with each stroke. It tired him but he fixed his eyes on the land in the distance.
