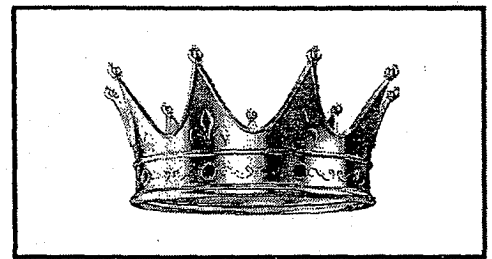
1ST STOP @ LEVEL 1 – GOOD OLD DAYS

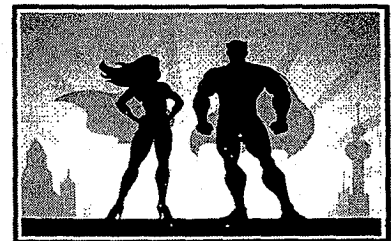

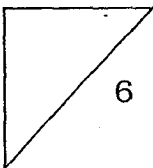
