Batik is a technique of wax-resist dyeing which originated from Indonesia. It utilises wax and fabric dye to create breathtaking patterns and designs on various kinds of cloth such as cotton, silk and linen. First, liquid wax is applied to a pattern on a piece of cloth. Next, the cloth is dyed. As the pattern resists colouring, it remains on the cloth when the wax is melted away.

Batik was most commonly used for making clothing back in the old days. Most women in Indonesia made a living making batik. Batik making was exclusive work for women in the beginning. In the 17th century, the Dutch brought batik back to Europe. Batik then caught the attention of Western designers. Today, fashion designers all over the world use batik in their clothing designs. Interior designers also feature batik patterns in home decorations, from blankets to cushion covers to wallpaper.
