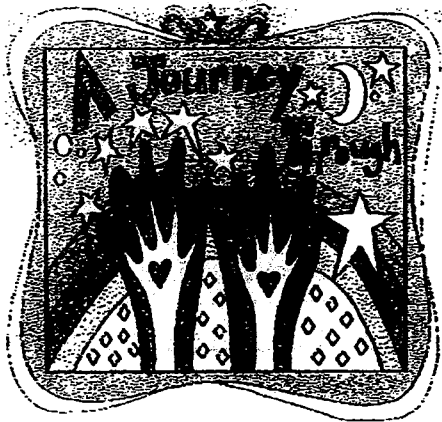

Free Style Wood



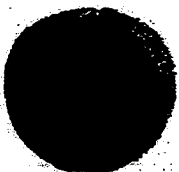
